Our Senior class presented a play called, "What a Life" which was a big success and all enjoyed it very much.

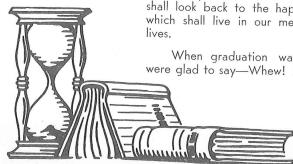
The banquet of course was the nicest ever had, and all had a wonderful time.

Wayne Hodges and Howell Micklers record at ends. Wayne got a scholarship to Florida for his performance.

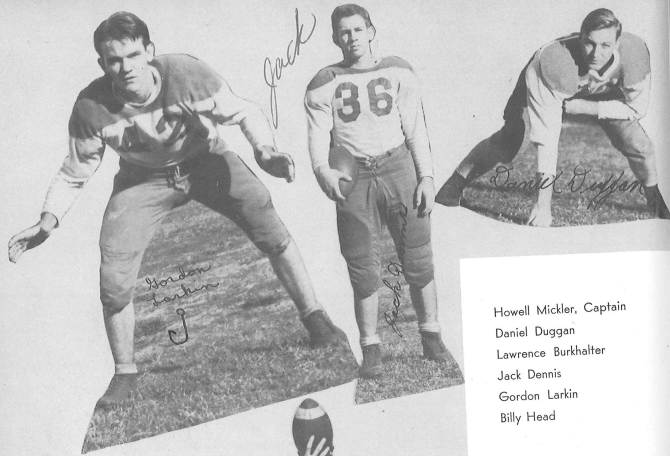
